PROFESSIONAL SUMMARY

Yussuf is an acting Assistant Professor at NYU Law School, where he teaches law students on the practice of law, including classroom instruction legal research and writing as well as hands-on, practical lawyering skills (e.g., oral argument, motion practice, alternative dispute resolution, and client counseling).

He is a graduate of Harvard Law School (J.D.), Columbia Law School (L.L.M.), and the Stanford Graduate School of Business (M.S.). He founded Joseph, Aleem & Slowik, a full-service healthcare law practice based in Atlanta, Georgia. He also co-founded the Aleem Law Firm, a plaintiff's trial practice specializing in catastrophic injury and medical malpractice cases. Yussuf previously worked as a transactional lawyer at the law firm of Weil, Gotshal & Manges, LLP.

Yussuf is the author of the book *Small Law; Big Success* (Edward Elgar Publishing) and has written articles on multiple legal topics, including business law, healthcare law, and civil practice. His work has appeared in Yahoo Finance, Law.com, Law360, the Daily Report, the Georgia Bar Journal, the ABA's Section of International Law, and Emory Law School's Corporate Governance Law Review.

While at Harvard Law School, Yussuf was a member of the Harvard Legal Aid Bureau where he represented clients on a *pro bono* basis. He also externed for the Chief Justice of the Colorado Supreme Court. At Columbia Law School, Yussuf was named a James Kent Scholar (highest academic achievement) and was awarded the Jeffrey Williams Memorial Prize for writing the best paper in critical legal theory.

In 2020, Yussuf was named Georgia's Distinguished Leader for his disaster relief efforts in response to Hurricane Dorian. Yussuf is a member of Emory Law School's Law Firm Externship Program and volunteers at the Children's Hospital of Atlanta and the Atlanta VA Hospital.

Violence in the Administrative State (job market paper)

Drawing on an original, interview-based case study of Immigration and Customs Enforcement and a review of six decades of social science literature, this Article offers a theory of physical violence in the administrative state that challenges foundational assumptions about administrative law. One-third of federal employees work for administrative agencies that police, fight wars, enforce immigration law, or incarcerate people. While these agencies are saturated with administrative law, this law often fails to constrain these administrators' behavior, leading to arbitrary violence. Conventional administrative law fails here because it is premised on a model of the administrative state to which these agencies do not conform. Most administrative law is designed for bureaucracy, whose hallmark is rational information processing using standardized rules and procedures. Ordinarily designed to safeguard core rule of law values, when bureaucratic administrative law is applied to agencies in the domain of violence, it often masks, and at worst accelerates, unauthorized violence. Recognizing the domain of violence can help us understand how and whether law can check unauthorized violence in the administrative state.

The Two Faces of the Administrative State (work in progress, with Professor Jessica Bulman-Pozen)

This May, the Heritage Foundation released a policy roadmap for the next Republican president. Even as this roadmap advocates for “deconstructing the administrative state,” it suggests expanding defense, immigration enforcement, and intelligence agencies, and devolving power to their administrators. This

definitional slip is commonplace – many judges, scholars, and politicians write these agencies out of the administrative state. But it obscures significant inconsistencies in the administrative law that courts and presidents have made for different agencies. Our understanding of administrative law turns on dichotomies. Think of rulemaking versus adjudication, or formal versus informal action. But this understanding has largely overlooked one of the most consequential dichotomies: the divergence between the benefits and regulatory agencies that make up the administrative state’s first “face,” and the law enforcement, military, and intelligence agencies of its second face. This Essay gives a birds-eye view of the divergent law and developmental trajectory of the two faces. Presidents have often approached centralization and control in the two faces differently. And judicial review of agencies in the second face is more permissive, when it comes to reviewability of agency action, deference doctrines, and federal transparency law.

Administrative Civil Liberties Law (work in progress)

During the Trump Administration, immigrant plaintiffs repeatedly challenged diffuse or unannounced immigration enforcement policies in court using the Administrative Procedure Act. In the past, similar lawsuits had foundered on black-letter doctrines of deference, finality, and exhaustion. And comparable suits fared poorly at the Supreme Court during this time. Using an original case database, this Article shows that in dozens of cases, many of them large class actions, district courts fashioned or adapted three administrative law doctrines that turned plaintiffs’ claims about informal agency enforcement actions into cognizable harms – *Accardi* claims, administrative pattern or practice claims, and unwritten policy claims. In general, administrative law in the courts has not effectively checked agencies in the domain of violence. But this original case study suggests more robust forms of judicial review are possible under existing law. It also points to a hydraulic dynamic between ordinary administrative law and higher-profile areas of public law. Administrative law may allow courts that wish to avoid politicized legal conflicts to recognize infringements on fundamental interests while lowering the temperature of these disputes.

Citizenship Federalism, 81 MD. L. REV. 503 (2022) ([link](#))

Though immigration federalism has attracted much attention from scholars and policymakers in recent years, the scholarship has not fully explored the outer limits of states’ power to regulate noncitizens. This Article provides an account of these outer limits. It argues that states have a de facto but underutilized power to practice what it calls “citizenship federalism” – a power to define the boundaries of the state community using different values, norms, and criteria than the federal Constitution does. The Article specifically explores states’ power to vary from federal constitutional law’s use of territoriality to divide noncitizens who are within the community and the protection of the laws from those excluded from it. In service of its argument, it provides a novel, systematic analysis of the effects of state law on former immigrants now living outside the United States, a group that has grown into the millions with increased deportations and voluntary out-migration.

Deadly Ambiguity: IHL’s Prohibition on Targeting Civilian Objects and the Risks of Decentered Interpretation, 53 TEX. INT’L L. J. 239 (2018) (co-authored with Zachary Manfredi) ([link](#))

The law of war has long prohibited attacks on civilian infrastructure and objects. But in recent years, U.S. military and diplomatic agencies incrementally advanced an expanded interpretation of a treaty rule embodying this prohibition. The agencies claimed that the United States has the legal authority to target the “war-sustaining capabilities” of enemies in armed conflict. Though the category of “war-sustaining capabilities” is ambiguous, U.S. practice and public statements suggest it includes what were considered protected civilian objects, like prisons and civilian-operated factories. This expanded interpretation poses risks to civilians in armed conflict. Moreover, the process by which this interpretation occurred – with the United States, in isolation, developing a position likely to be accorded significant weight in customary international law – risks undermining both the content and the normative authority of international

humanitarian law rules. The Article identifies two sets of material forces that drove this interpretive drift, and suggests refinements to international institutions that could help build consensus on the meaning of ambiguous rules.

Defining the Boundaries of Marketing: Public Perception and Unfair Trade Practices in the Digital Era (job talk paper)

Companies use advanced techniques to shape consumer choices, but how the law should respond remains unclear. Analyzing unfair trade practice laws at federal and state levels reveals divergent evaluation criteria: some states emphasize moral standards, while others and the Federal Trade Commission prioritize consumer harm and impact on freedom of choice. Here, I propose that the legal framework for online marketing strategies should reflect public perceptions. Through experimental vignette studies, I show which practices individuals consider less morally acceptable than a neutral choice design, as well as what are the factors that underlie these judgments. Drawing from these findings, I suggest expanding the criteria of unfairness to include online marketing strategies that pose the risk of privacy violations. In certain instances, the necessity to prove actual harm should be reevaluated as a criterion to classify a practice as unfair. Furthermore, I propose that the concept of unfairness should also encompass the potential threat to freedom of choice, yet its assessment should hinge on consumers' viewpoints.

Does it matter what people lie about? (working paper) (with Peter Krebs and Stefanie Jung)

We studied how people's moral judgment of lying in pre-contractual negotiations compares to their views on legal consequences, specifically the right to cancel the contract. Our research involved 832 German students and 885 participants from Germany, Italy, and the US. Findings show that respondents are more likely to consider lies immoral than to support contract cancellation, but this varies depending on the lie's subject. Lies about the contract's subject or reservation price blur the distinction between legal and moral assessments. On the other hand, lies about product availability or alternative offers are viewed as immoral, but not necessarily warranting contract cancellation. Our results contribute to the psychological literature on people's normative beliefs and the legal debate about normative underpinnings of contract law.

Personalization and Privacy: An Empirical Investigation of Consumer Attitudes Towards Data Processing (working paper) (with Daria Baltag)

Personalization is common in online interactions, where businesses use personal data to customize user experiences. Within the EU, the legality of such data processing, particularly in the context of generating revenue through personalized ads, is subject to debate. This study investigates consumer attitudes towards data sharing for personalization, using three experiments (N=3,436). The findings indicate that the majority of participants are hesitant to share data, regardless of whether it's for ads or services. These outcomes hold significant implications for ongoing legal discussions. We argue that companies should only process personal data for personalization with explicit opt-in consent from customers to respect privacy attitudes.

Before Equal Protection: The Fall of Cross-dressing Bans and the Transgender Legal Movement, 40 *Law and History Review* 4 (2023) (discussed in [The Washington Post](#)).

This Article offers a novel history of the campaign to de-criminalize crossdressing in the United States. It invites a reassessment of the contemporary LGBT movement's legal history. I argue that a trans legal movement developed separately but in tandem with constitutional claims on behalf of gays and lesbians. In some cases, gender outlaws attempted to defend the right to cross-dress without asking courts to understand or adjudicate their gender. These efforts met with mixed success: courts began to recognize gender outlaws' constitutional rights, but litigation also limited which outlaws could qualify as trans legal subjects. Examining the legal strategies of these earlier gender outlaws offers a window into the messy process of translating gender non-conforming experiences and subjectivities

into something that courts could understand. Transgender was analytically separated from gay and lesbian in life and law before it was reattached as a distinct minority group.

The Visibility Trap, 89 University of Chicago Law Review 1515 (2022).

A review of Anna Lvovsky’s *Vice Patrol* situates the book’s historical insight in contemporary debates over the relationship between legal strategy and social visibility for gender and sexual minorities. Lvovsky disentangles the forms of cultural salience, stereotype, and self-representation that often fly under the banner of “visibility.” This Book Review reads contemporary anti-transgender policing and transgender civil rights struggles through *Vice Patrol* to explore possible escape routes from the visibility trap. Through a deeper understanding of the way criminal enforcement metabolizes popular representation, the review encourages contemporary transgender advocates to develop a kind of strategic intelligibility, by distinguishing circumstances and situations where visibility to the state is more or less necessary and desirable.

Zoned Out: How Zoning Law Undermines Family Law’s Functional Turn, 128 Yale Law Journal 2412 (2019) (discussed in [The Atlantic](#)).

A fatal conflict in the legal definition of family lurks at the intersection of family law and zoning law. Family law doctrines have increasingly embraced the claims of “functional families”—those whose bonds can be traced to cohabitation and shared domestic life. At the same time, zoning laws have narrowed to recognize only formal families, effectively restricting residency to individuals related by blood, marriage, or adoption. As a result, family law’s “functional turn” remains vulnerable in at least thirty-one states. Using original legal analysis and historical research, this Note illuminates the contradiction between family law and zoning law, explains how it arose, and argues that it must be resolved to protect diverse family forms. The Note surveys the “functional turn” in state family law and develops a novel historical account of the shifting definition of “family” in zoning law, documenting its “formal turn.” It then offers normative and practical reasons why the definition of family should be loosened, offering recommendations for legislative and judicial reform.

The Equal Right to Exclude: Compelled Expressive Commercial Conduct and the Road to 303 Creative v. Elenis (job market paper)

This Article explains how speech became the constitutional vehicle for the right to discriminate on religious grounds. Using extensive original archival research, case materials, and little-known accounts of key figures, the Article reconstructs the New Christian Right’s worldview to make sense of its legal strategy. The Article’s central thesis is that this historical reconstruction is essential to fully appreciate the contemporary transformation of the First Amendment. It suggests that scholars have significantly underrated the arm of the conservative legal movement that uses free speech and association arguments not to deregulate for its own sake, but to empower conservative religious communities who understand themselves as victims of regulatory discrimination.

The Privatization of Civil Rights

Over decades of mobilization, civil rights advocates secured the means to enforce certain equality norms in the key spaces of civil society—in welfare provision, housing, workplaces, schools, and public commerce. In recent years, a conservative counter-mobilization has succeeded in shifting the balance between public and private, rendering the precarious civil rights arrangement vulnerable across diverse arenas. This Article surveys developments in the civil rights law of social services, public schooling, and employment to better diagnose the transformation. It argues that attacks on civil rights law across these domains constitutes a broad privatization of civil rights, because they shift the

forum for resolving disputes over norms from those designed to publicly articulate shared values to the governance structures of private religious institutions.
